## **HPV Roundtable Resources**

The National HPV Vaccination Roundtable's Survivor Involvement Task Group recognized the power of survivor voices and wanted to create ways to bring HPV-cancer survivors to provider audiences.

The task group created two resources for partners to use:

- Survivor Speaker Database for those who want to invite a survivor to their conference, grand rounds, or other event. The database lists organizations with HPV-cancer survivors willing to tell their stories. The database contains the organization's name, cancer type, speaker locations, contact information, description of activities and social media links. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has announced that the following three appendices in the textbook Epidemiology and Prevention of Vaccine-Preventable Diseases, also known as "The Pink Book," have been updated in the online edition:

- Vaccine Excipient and Media Summary in Appendix B
- CDC Contact Information and Resources in Appendix F
- Immunization Grantee List in Appendix F

The online edition includes not only the updates to these appendices, but also a <a href="2017 supplement">2017 supplement</a> — including a new chapter on Human Papillomavirus - released earlier this year.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recently published the following two new clinical reports:

- 1. <u>The Need to Optimize Adolescent Immunization</u> reviews the current epidemiology of meningococcus, pertussis, HPV and influenza in adolescents; and covers immunization rates and barriers to adhering to the adolescent immunization schedule.
- 2. <u>Practical Approaches to Optimize Adolescent Immunization</u> discusses ways to improve immunization rates, including strategies to enhance parental confidence in immunization.

A summary from the AAP lists the key points highlighted in these two clinical reports.

- Adolescent immunization rates are lower than those for younger children
- Every healthcare visit is an opportunity to review and update immunization status
- A strong recommendation from the healthcare provider is the most important reason why parents choose to have their children vaccinated
- Substantial provider time may be necessary for counselling patients and families who are vaccine hesitant or wish to refuse vaccines
- HPV vaccination presents a distinctive set of challenges
- Healthcare technology can be useful and effective in decreasing missed opportunities for vaccination
- Extending care into school-based settings is an alternative strategy that may help improve adolescent immunization rates
