Equity Initiative National Strategic Council, she is regularly tapped by leading organizations and Fortune 500 companies around the globe to share her story and expertise.

Susie captured the attention of many on a national level dancing as a professional cheerleader in the NFL during the 2011-2012 season for the Oakland Raiders as a Raiderette. "The Dream Lived" is a true, inspirational story that demonstrates hope, determination, and the magic of knowing what life is like when you live your dreams. It's an example and a reality that all dreams are attainable.

In March of 2021, Susie was diagnosed with anal cancer caused by HPV. As a cancer survivor, she's passionate and finds it imperative to share her story to the world. She hopes to offer awareness, education and knowledge regarding anal cancer, HPV, and the HPV vaccine to as many as she can. Protecting future generations from this deadly virus with the HPV vaccine is a must to Susie. Virginia Senkomago, PhD, MPHEpidemiologist in cancer surveillance branch, Division of Cancer Prevention and Control.

Dr. Virginia Senkomago is an epidemiologist in the Cancer Surveillance Branch in the Division of Cancer Prevention and Control at the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). She works on the production and dissemination of various U.S. Cancer statistics (USCS) data sets and is also a subject matter expert on human papillomavirus (HPV)-associated cancers and cervical cancer. Dr. Senkomago publishes on HPV-associated cancers in USCS data and other data sets. She obtained a PhD in Epidemiology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and an MPH from Yale University.

Mike also enjoys sharing his story of survival to bring hope to those facing devastating obstacles in their life by finding blessings around you even in the darkest of storms, and he was previously recognized as the HPV Vaccination Advocate of the Year by the California HPV Vaccination Roundtable.

Michelle Fiscus, MD, FAAP

Chief Medical Officer, Association of Immunization Managers (AIM)

Dr. Michelle Fiscus is a board-certified pediatrician and public health advocate who practiced general pediatrics in Franklin, TN, for 17 years before transitioning to a career in public health in 2016. She served as the Medical Director of the Tennessee Department of Health's Vaccine-Preventable Diseases and Immunization Program and led the state's COVID-19 vaccination efforts until July 2021. She now serves as the inaugural Chief Medical Officer of the Association of Immunization Managers, the professional organization of the 64 CDC-funded immunization programs across the U.S. states, territories, and major cities. Dr. Fiscus has served as a senior health policy consultant for the National Academy for State Health Policy and recently completed a term on the Board of Directors of the American Academy of Pediatrics. Dr. Fiscus is a

proud graduate of Indiana University and Indiana University School of Medicine and completed her residency in pediatrics at Riley Children's Health at Indiana University Medical Center. She and her family recently relocated to their forever home in Maryland.



Cassandra 'Sandy' Pingali, MPH, MS

Epidemiologist, Immunization Services Division, National Center for Immunization and Respiratory Diseases, *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention*

Cassandra (Sandy) Pingali is an epidemiologist at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in the Immunization Services Division. As part of her role as the subject matter expert for the National Immunization Survey-Teen, she leads a yearly MMWR assessing vaccination coverage among adolescents ages 13-17 years. Her research interests include adolescent vaccinations, vaccine confidence, and health disparities.

One of his research interests is to highlight the impact of HPV vaccine initiation at age 9. Kunal is a Health Economist by training, and holds a PhD in Health Economics and Outcomes Research from Virginia Commonwealth University.



Stephanie Staras, MSPH, PhD

Professor and Associate Chair of Faculty Development, Health Outcomes and Biomedical Informatics, Program Co-Lead Cancer Control and Population Sciences, UF Cancer Center, Associate Director for the Institute for Child Health Policy, University of Florida

Stephanie A. S. Staras, M.S.P.H., Ph.D., is a Professor and Associate Chair for Faculty Development in the Department of Health Outcomes and Biomedical Informatics. She is also the Associate Director of the Institute for Child Health Policy and co-lead for the UF Health Cancer Center's Cancer Control and Population Science Program. Dr. Staras is an expert in rigorous and impactful research in prevention of HPV-related cancers and using implementation science methods to increase health equity. She focuses on improving the clinical recommendations for, parent receptiveness to, and access

to HPV vaccines among adolescents within Florida. She has served as Principal Investigator on investigator-initiated National Institutes of Health (NIH) National Cancer Institute (NCI) funded and foundation grants with total PI funding of over \$11 million. Her large, high-enrolling projects contributed critically to the UF Cancer Center NCI designation by demonstrating the necessary impact in the catchment area and comprising 40% of UF's clinical trial accruals in the past three years.



Melinda Wharton, MD, MPH

Associate Director for Vaccine Policy, National Center for Immunization and Respiratory Diseases, *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention*

Dr. Melinda Wharton currently serves as the Associate Director for Vaccine Policy and Acting Chief Medical Officer in the National Center for Immunization and Respiratory Diseases at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. She received her medical degree from Harvard Medical School and master's degree in public health from Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health. She completed her training in internal medicine at the University of Michigan and her infectious diseases training at the Duke University Medical Center, in Durham, NC. Dr. Wharton joined CDC as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer in 1986 and was assigned to the Tennessee Department of Health and Environment in

Nashville, TN. She joined CDC's immunization program in 1992, and since that time has held a variety of positions. From 2006 to 2013, she served as Deputy Director of the National Center for Immunization and Respiratory Diseases and from 2013 to 2021, as Director, Immunization Services Division, NCIRD. She previously served as a member (2009-2015) and as chair (2012-2015) of WHO's Global Advisory Committee on Vaccine Safety and as a member of FDA's Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee (2006-2020).

Mollie Aleshire, DNP, MSN, APRN, FNP-BC, PPCNP-BC, FNAP

Assistant Professor, DNP Project Coordinator, University of Louisville School of Nursing

Dr. Mollie Aleshire completed doctoral training at the University of Kentucky in 2010. She has more than 20 years of nursing experience and, for more than a decade, has mentored undergraduate and graduate students in the classroom, online learning, and clinical settings, as well as in community and global environments. Dr. Aleshire is certified as a primary care family and pediatric nursing practitioner. Dr. Aleshire previously served as an associate professor at the University of Kentucky College of Nursing and at the University of North Carolina Greensboro School of Nursing, where she also held the position of director of the DNP program.

Dr. Aleshire's research focuses on health disparities, health promotion, healthcare access, and cancer prevention/

screening for minority populations. Her program of research aims to use a community-engaged approach to promote health and healthcare for disadvantaged groups, including sexual and gender minorities, black women, and women with increased risk for colorectal, breast, and HPV-associated cancers. Dr. Aleshire has authored numerous publications and presentations. Dr. Aleshire is a member of several professional organizations, serves as a manuscript reviewer for a number of journals, and actively participates in professional, university, community, and international service endeavors. Due to her contributions to interprofessional education, scholarship, and practice, Dr. Aleshire has been recognized as a Distinguished Scholar and Fellow of the National Academy of Practice in Nursing.



Alice P. Chen, DMD, FAAPD
Associate Professor, Roseman University

Dr. Alice Chen is an Associate Professor at Roseman University's Nevada campus. As a board-certified pediatric dentist and a Fellow of the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry, Dr. Chen is passionate about the prevention of oral diseases in children. Her focus in HPV prevention has led to collaborations with cancer organizations on both state and national levels. Dr. Chen strongly believes that just like providers from other facets of healthcare, dental professionals have a responsibility in advocating for HPV vaccine and prevention strategies. In her role as an educator and clinician, she works every day to make that a reality for dental students and dental residents.



Jennifer Cunningham-Erves, PhD, MPH, MAEd, MS, CHES Associate Professor, Department of Health Policy, Director of Community Engaged Research, Office of Health Equity, Vanderbilt University Medical Center

Dr. Jennifer Cunningham-Erves is a behavior scientist focused on cancer prevention behaviors and lowering associated disparities. Her research seeks to improve HPV vaccine uptake among children through behavioral interventions and implementation science while intersecting the sociocultural environment. Dr. Cunningham-Erves has also spearheaded efforts to identify and test strategies to better engage community members and leaders throughout the research process with a goal to increase understanding and participation of diverse populations. As the Director of Community Engaged Research, she is developing and will oversee a program that supports the collaborative research opportunities between academic researchers and the

community along with the community-engaged research experiences of faculty, early-stage investigators, students, and staff at Vanderbilt University Medical Center.



Daisy Y. Morales-Campos, PhD

Associate Professor, The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, School of Public Health, San Antonio Regional Campus

Dr. Daisy Morales-Campos' research interests include public health education, cancer prevention, and maintenance of behavior change among Hispanics. She is especially interested in health, culture, and reproduction issues that immigrant women from Latin America and their children encounter in the U.S. She has extensive experience in the design and implementation of community-based participatory research, culturally appropriate research methods and protocols, cancer screening studies, and interventions for Hispanics utilizing a promotora model. Her research currently focuses on community-based and health system interventions to promote cancer prevention in underserved communities and in FQHC settings by working with providers and health care

systems with an implementation science focus.



Synovia Moss, MPA

National Project Manager, Good Health Women's Immunization Networks (Good Health WINs), *National Council of Negro Women, Inc.*

Synovia Moss is the CEO/Managing Partner of Moss Consulting & Management Group, Inc., which specializes in designing and leading large-scale community engagement initiatives to address social determinants of health with communities of color. She brings over two decades of expertise in marketing, strategic planning, program management, relationship building, and grassroots advocacy for organizations of all sizes and sectors. Currently, she is the Project Manager for Good Health Women's Immunization Networks (Good Health WINs) for the National Council of Negro Women, Inc., with a reach of over 4,500,000 in the African American community. Good Health WINs partners with NCNW's 32 national affiliate organizations and the black Greek letter organizations to

increase vaccination coverage across different racial and ethnic adult populations currently experiencing disparities. Most recently, Synovia served as a global strategic advisor for the Brain Matters Early Learning Global Network, launched in 27 countries across four continents. Her love of neuroscience, community engagement, and program management led her to become the first program director for the Child Advancement Network (CAN) and Vroom Wisconsin Initiative at the Clinical and Translational Science Institute (CTSI) at the Medical College of Wisconsin. Synovia has an adept skill to translate science into relatable programs, policy, and effective messaging leading to collective impact.

Guided by the tenants of faith, family and community, Synovia continues to advocate for women's and children's issues and health equity at the local, statewide and national levels. She is a member of the City of Milwaukee Mayor's Task Force on Early Care; board of director for Pastors United; Chair of Health Equity for the Wisconsin Immunization Neighborhood's statewide coalition of immunization advocates and is a member of the Milwaukee County Emergency Response Team for COVID-19. She designed and coordinated the "Vaccine Voices, Vaccine Choices" campaign in partnership with the Wisconsin Immunization Neighborhood, African American Ladies Empowered to Grow Opportunities (ALEGO), Pastors United, and other community-based groups to address vaccine hesitancy in the African American community. Synovia is an influencer and leads by example. She is currently the president and charter member of the NCNW Milwaukee Section and co-chair of the NCNW National Health Equity COVID-19 Sub-Committee. 

Apart from his academic position, he serves on the Lancet Commission on Vaccine Refusal, Acceptance, and Demand and has advised the WHO and CDC on vaccination. He has also advised the President's Cancer Panel under two presidents and the


National Vaccine Advisory Committee. The Announcement Approach Training, developed by Dr. Brewer and colleagues, teaches health care providers to communicate more effectively about HPV vaccination and other vaccines for adolescents. Over 1,700 providers and clinical staff in 17 states have received the training to date. The National Cancer Institute designated it as a Research-Tested Intervention Program, and the CDC and American Academy of Pediatrics now recommend use of presumptive announcements when recommending HPV vaccine. Joel Palefsky, M.D., C.M., F.R.C.P.(C) is Professor of Medicine and Infectious Diseases at the University of California San Francisco School of Medicine. He is an internationally recognized expert on the molecular biology, treatment, pathogenesis, and natural history of anogenital human papillomavirus infections, particularly in the setting of HIV infection. He is the director of the world's first clinic devoted to prevention of anal cancer, the Anal Neoplasia Clinic Research and Education Center at the UCSF Cancer Center. biomarkers of progression. He is founder and past president of the International Anal Neoplasia Society and is past president of the International Papillomavirus Society. He is the founder and chairperson of the IPVS International HPV Awareness Campaign.
